# Some Highlights in the History of the School

That the Class of 1933 may have a permanent record of some of the important events in the remarkable history of their school, this brief summary is here given. It is a record of a growth perhaps unparalleled in educational history, and of an achievement made possible only by earnest effort, unflagging devotion to an ideal, and honest and efficient service.

- February 26, 1917: The first Class of The Bentley School is held in Room 410, Huntington Chambers, Boston, with twenty-nine members in attendance.
- March 22, 1917: Organization of The Bentley Associates, which has come to be the Alumni Association of the school.
- September, 1917: The school year opens in the new classroom at 125 Tremont Street with 297 evening students.
- January, 1918: First Day Class starts with twenty-three students.
- The World War: During the period of the war, many students are called to the colors. Women are temporarily admitted to the evening classes and three of the approximately one hundred and fifty enrolled are numbered among the graduates. After the armistice, some 375 disabled veterans are sent to the school under the sponsorship of the Veterans' Bureau, 122 of them completing the course.
- September, 1919: Additional space is leased at 128 Tremont Street.
- June, 1920: A rapidly increasing enrollment makes necessary additional space and the third floor at 921 Boylston Street (our present building) is leased to complement the Tremont Street facilities.

1920–1921: The enrollment for the school year ending in June, 1921, totals 2,042.

SEPTEMBER, 1921: The second floor at 921 Boylston Street is taken over by the school.

August, 1922: An enrollment of 2,275 forces us to take over the entire building at 921 Boylston Street.

1927–1928: During this school year the increasing demand for space is met by the use of the third floor at 883 Boylston Street as an annex.

September, 1931: Extensive alterations have been made in the building to make it possible for the students previously housed in the annex to find accommodations on the street floor, formerly leased for mercantile display purposes, and for the first time the building is now used from top to bottom for educational purposes. The school now has a plant which quite ideally meets the needs of its 2,711 students. What a far cry this is from the days of the beginning group of twenty-nine men in 1917! The total area of floor space devoted to our work is approximately 22,000 square feet, or a little more than half an acre.


With Mr. Lindsay they were kept busy. The order of the day was: "In your spare time, fellows, do this little problem." They did it and liked it, too—that's a fact.


### Division Three

## Beta Tau Alpha

The year 1922 saw the inception of a new fraternity, Beta Tau Alpha, at The Bentley School, founded "to promote and perpetuate the ideals of upright character, friendship, and good fellowship among the members."

Overcoming many obstacles during the earlier years of its existence, the organization moved steadily forward and was incorporated in 1926. A successful reunion was staged in June, 1927, and in the fall of the same year a house was established at 1071 Beacon Street, Brookline, where its many activities were centered for five years.

The tenth anniversary reunion in celebration of the founding of the fraternity was held June 10 and 11, 1932. A formal dance at Lodge Pole Ranch, the Beverly estate of Mr. and Mrs. Otis E. Dunham; a luncheon at the Hotel Vendome as Mr. Bentley's guests; and a banquet and entertainment in the Princess Ballroom of the Hotel Somerset were highlights of the occasion which brought together many members with the consequent renewing of old acquaintances. From every point of view the reunion was a huge success, and although the attendance was not as large as had been hoped for, because of business conditions, it was, all things considered, very satisfactory.

In September, 1932, a house was established at 287 Kent Street, Brookline. The new home of the fraternity is the former mansion of Ex-Governor Powers of Maine, and is a truly beautiful place. It is excellently equipped and capable of accommodating twice the number of members that the old house would. The fraternity grounds comprise more than an acre of terraces, lawns, and gardens, together with a large garage.

Open-house nights, smokers, house dances, and parties were well attended and enjoyed throughout the year. As in past years, competition was keen between the fraternities and dormitories in the fields of sport including football and basketball. Bridge and cribbage tournaments were also held. B. T. A. participated in all these and took its share of victories.

The fraternity, both as individuals and as a group, is greatly indebted to Henry Y. Porter, Chairman of the Board of Trustees and alumni advisor of the fraternity, for his untiring efforts and self-sacrificing work in its behalf during the past eight years.

The fraternity is proud that it has been privileged to share in many Bentley activities, included among which have been its representation on the Student Council, "Benboo," and the bowling team. It is equally ready to do its share in the future.

## Alpha Gamma Pi

### Alpha Chapter — Bentley School — Boston

IN 1923 a group of five Jewish students organized the Alpha Gamma Pi Fraternity for the Day classes of The Bentley School. From the group of five the fraternity has grown to an organization consisting of sixty-two members.

The first meetings were held in one of the dormitory rooms, and now the regular meetings are held at the Hotel Brunswick. The meetings are bi-monthly and are for the purpose of discussing cultural, social, and practical everyday problems arising in the field of accounting.

The fraternity holds three dances and a banquet each year. The first national convention of the fraternity was held in Boston on February 21, 22, and 23 of 1932, and was attended by members of the other chapters at Northwestern University, The Wharton School of Finance, and New York University. Fraternity members were present from distant states as well as from those nearby.

The prime requirements for admission to the fraternity are: High scholastic standing, personality, character, and past performance. The membership continues if the requirements are met, and after graduation the membership is for life.

DIVIDENDS—State whether you heard them pass and give an approximate idea of which way they went.


OTHER INCOME—No, we know it's a hoax.
